Why Maryland Should Care...



- Colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death among men and women in Maryland after lung cancer
 - Breast cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death among women in Maryland after lung cancer
 - Female breast cancer mortality rates increased among blacks and decreased among whites from 2012 to 2016.

What About Calvert County?

Calvert is above 25% U.S. mortality rate for breast cancer

Calvert is no longer above 10-25% of US mortality rate for colorectal cancer

Also note: Calvert is 10-25% above US incidence rate for lung cancer, 2012-2016


This translates to 61 new cases for breast cancer and 41 new cases of colorectal cancer each year


WHAT IS COLORECTAL CANCER?

Cancer that occurs in the colon or rectum.



How Do People Get Colorectal Cancer?

- Usually starts from a "POLYP"
- A polyp is a growth in the colon or rectum that <u>should</u> <u>not be there</u>.
- Over time, some polyps can turn into cancer.



Who is at Risk?

➤ Men or women 50 or over

Personal history of colon polyps or colon, breast, uterine or ovarian cancer

- Family history: Parent, Sibling or Child
 - History of Ulcerative Colitis or Crohn's Disease


What are the Symptoms?

- ✓ Blood in or on your stool
 - ✓ Any change in bowel habits
 - ✓ Unexplained weight loss
 - √"Pencil like stools"

WHY SCREENING IS SO IMPORTANT...

Polyps usually do NOT have any symptoms!

It can take 10 years for a polyp to grow into a cancerous tumor.



The only method that can detect and remove precancerous polyps is the COLONOSCOPIXIDIE



Sigmoidoscopy






Colonoscopy The "Gold Standard" for colorectal screening.

Program Recommendations

- Clinical Breast Exams-Yearly
- Mammograms-Yearly beginning at age 40
- Pap Tests-Every 3 years, Every 5 years with HPV test

(Any concern should be checked out!)

Symptoms

- > Discharge
- Dimpling
- > Pain
- > Lump
- Unexplained change in shape or size
- > Redness, Scaliness
- Nipple Tenderness

Process

- Call for intake and determine eligibility (meet income and residency requirements)
- Complete program consent
- Schedule appointments
- Nurse case manager provides follow up
